PE

PE this term will be taught twice a week:

Games will be on Mondays – children need to wear correct school PE kit into school.

Swimming is on Thursdays. All children need to bring in a swimsuit and towel.

Art

Children will investigate and improve their observational drawing skills, develop these into larger paintings and printmaking and use digital experimentation in the style of Henri Rausseau.

Throughout this theme, children will explore the work of artists such as Henri Rousseau and contemporary artist Ruth Daniels, to further their understanding in geography and the rainforest regions of South America. These artists give excellent opportunities to discuss composition; where the



whole picture is filled with foliage, to compare the observational skills of the artists; to express preferences and extend the use of artistic language and vocabulary.



How you can help your child

- Make sure your child reads daily and discuss the stories in terms of reasons for characters' actions and reasons for the author's choices of vocabulary. Don't forget to record reading sessions in reading records.
- Discuss meanings of any new vocabulary your child comes across.
- Support with any Grammar homework.
- > Test children on their weekly spellings.

How you can help your child:

- Practise times tables on Times Table Rock Stars and orally.

Please continue to support your child at home by listening to them read and encouraging them to complete their homework books each week.
